Everybody Loves St. Barnabas

A MESSAGE FROM WILLIAM V. DAY



And that 'everybody' refers to those who had a loved one cared for at St. Barnabas ...or those who have experienced independent living at St. Barnabas... or those who have relied upon the St. Barnabas Medical Center for flu shots or blood pressure checks. Is the word 'loves' too strong? For some, 'likes' is a better word. But not for Nancy J.

Nancy J.'s husband was a memory care patient isolated by Covid but cared for by a dedicated staff and befriended by a fellow patient. He didn't make it through Covid, but they were together every day by phone and even got to say goodbye.

And not for Tom G. whose 30-year friendship led to a life-saving six months at St. Barnabas Nursing Home.

Steve was being cared for in a facility in Oregon. This under-staffed home catheterized as many patients as possible to reduce care time, and a morphine pump

was used to handle Steve's pain rather than having a qualified nurse or doctor monitor and prescribe in person. Tom G. was able to arrange for Steve's transport and transfer to St. Barnabas Nursing home. Six months later Steve was off the morphine pump and looking forward to living in an apartment with the aid of a home caregiver.

And not for Kathleen and Helen, independent living roommates.

Both had led very different, but very rewarding lives. One married and was a happy homemaker with three children. The other was single and enjoyed a teaching career, even enlisting in a women's service corps during World War II. A church meeting brought them together and introduced them to The Village at St. Barnabas. Both financially and socially, they clicked and took a two-bedroom apartment at The Village. For more than 15 years they enjoyed all of the Village's amenities and activities. Ironically the oldest by some 10 years, was the first to go. They are both gone now, but those two did 'love' St. Barnabas.

These are the 'everybody' I include in my message. There are many people who only know about St. Barnabas from radio and television ads. But it is word of mouth and testimonials like Nancy J. and Tom G. and Kathleen and Helen who do 'love' St. Barnabas. That 'love' was earned by the men and women who have been touched by St. Barnabas. And for them the word 'love' is a perfect fit.

"I grew up knowing I wanted some type of career in criminal justice," Isaac said, "and when I


completed my Master's degree while working for St. Barnabas security, it seemed right to continue on that track. I was proud to be promoted to Assistant Director of Security."

M meet Marcia Sweet: Antiques Expert. Bridge Partner. Cherished Grandmother.

When Marcia Sweet moved to The Village at St. Barnabas, she didn't just bring her belongings. She brought with her a rich history filled with family, antiques, adventure and a deep love for life's little joys.

At 85, Marcia moved from the quiet town of Gowanda, New York, where she had lived since 1965 with her husband James. Life for Marcia had changed. She was alone after her husband's death and many of her friends were gone.

"Most shopping was a half hour's drive away, and in the winter, well, that was an adventure I'd rather not have," she said.

Her son Tim, formerly a minister at First Presbyterian Church of Bakerstown, suggested she consider senior living closer to family – and The Village was a perfect fit.

"Curiosity piqued – I agreed to visit...I felt an instant connection."

That connection was just the beginning. On move-in day, Marcia was greeted with a warm welcome – and warm blueberry muffins – from neighbor Ginger Thomas.

"We started chatting and discovered we had so much in common. It was downright uncanny."

Their friendship blossomed quickly, and they now watch Buffalo Bills games together.

"Life here has breathed new joy into my days. Who knew that at 85, I would find new friendships and reconnect with the game I love?" she said.

Marcia began life on a farm in upstate New York, where hard work was her foundation.

After marrying James, her high school sweetheart, in 1957, she and her husband both enjoyed fulfilling careers as teachers. They also shared a passion for collecting antiques, which grew from a hobby into a flourishing business when they retired.

"We dove headfirst into the antique business, traveling all over the United States, especially in the picturesque New England region," she said. "Those years were filled with amazing experiences. We met incredible people at shows, exchanged stories and found joy in every corner of our adventure."

Today Marcia's most prized pieces claim a cherished place in her apartment at The Village. Her dining room boasts a beautiful Kittinger table, a stunning piece from a venerable American furniture company founded in 1866 in Buffalo.

"Every piece we collected has a story," she said.

Marcia's favorite activities at The Village include playing bridge three times a week and exploring the extensive collection at The Village's library. Her nearby family helps keep her schedule full,

especially her four great-grandchildren.

"What I found here at The Village was a community that offered me everything I desired," she said. "Having everything I need right at my fingertips is such a relief, especially the Medical Center right next door."

The evening at the Pittsburgh Marriott North featured raffles and live and online bidding on an auction line-up of sports memorabilia, designer merchandise, art and jewelry, valued at thousands of dollars. All proceeds from the event support the St. Barnabas Free Care Fund which annually provides millions of dollars in charity care.

Failla acknowledged his award and recognized St. Barnabas' achievements on national television during a later telecast.

Urinary Health Matters

How to recognize the signs before they become serious.

Maintaining a healthy urinary tract is crucial as we age. Urinary tract infections (UTIs) are among the most common infections in older adults, and they can quickly become serious if not treated. At St. Barnabas Health System, staff members across all levels of care are trained to identify and respond to often subtle signs of a UTI, ensuring residents receive prompt treatment.

“Aging is probably the most critical factor,” said Dr. William Zillweger, St. Barnabas Health System Medical Director. “As we get older the immune system weakens, bladder muscles don’t work as efficiently, and that can lead to infection.”

Cognitive decline, immobility, incontinence and diabetes are other common risk factors for older adults. UTIs are responsible for 25 percent of hospitalizations for older adults, according to a study published by the National Institutes of Health.

Cognitive decline can make it difficult for residents to recognize symptoms like burning or urgency, Dr. Zillweger said.


Early Signs of Infection include:

- Drowsiness
- Frequent falls
- Agitation
- Fever
- Back or pelvic pain
- Blood in the urine
- Nausea and vomiting
- Decrease in appetite
- Confusion

“Sometimes people think it’s dementia, but it could be delirium from a UTI – and that’s treatable,” Dr. Zillweger said. “You have to go looking.”

That’s exactly what the Resident Relations and Communities teams at St. Barnabas do every day.

“Because our staff know our residents so well, we notice changes in them,” said Emily Tichansky, Director of Resident Relations at The Woodlands at St. Barnabas. “We’re experienced at recognizing warning signs of bladder infections, so if someone is acting strangely or is unusually weak, that’s a red flag. We intervene and help the resident receive medical attention immediately.”

In many cases, timely treatment prevents complications like bacteremia – a serious bloodstream infection that can result when UTIs go untreated. St. Barnabas rarely sees these extreme cases thanks to proactive monitoring, rapid response from staff and access to on-site medical care, according to Dr. Zillweger.

“Prevention is a top priority,” he explained. “Hydration plays a huge role. We encourage fluids and often recommend cranberry juice or vitamin C to help keep bacteria levels down. For those with recurrent UTIs, I sometimes prescribe low-dose antibiotics on a rotating schedule to break the cycle.”

St. Barnabas also emphasizes family involvement. “Families need to know what to look for,” Dr. Zillweger added. “Awareness is key. Sometimes a gut feeling is enough to spark a check-in, and that can make all the difference.”

Summer through the Windows

It's summer time at St. Barnabas...or soon will be. Ambulatory and wheelchair patients are outside whenever possible. Bed-ridden and patients with weakened immune systems must enjoy the flowers, trees, birds through windows.

A few still have the old windows in their rooms. Some windows could even date back to 1916 when we opened our doors at Gibsonia. There are 11 of the original 124 windows at the St. Barnabas Nursing Home that still need donors to sponsor their replacement with energy-efficient glass.

If you haven't yet given to the window campaign, please do.

A \$2,000 donation will install a window, but any amount will help us reach our goal of \$240,000. To date, \$226,217 has been given.
